Circle Public Schools Training Rules

School policy is in effect concerning dress code. Coaches or advisors, at their discretion, may require more than the minimum.

HOURS: Weeknights as per city curfew (10:00 p.m.)

Following a home contest, return home within one hour if there is a game the next day. When returning from an away contest, return home immediately. Friday and Saturday nights will have a minimum curfew of 12:00 midnight (as per city curfew). Coaches and advisors may establish earlier curfews.

1st Offense: Warning with disciplinary action by coach or advisor according to severity.

2nd Offense: Suspended for one week of interscholastic competition.

3rd Offense: Dismissed from team.

Alcohol, Drugs, & Tobacco Use during Extracurricular Activities

Students participating in extracurricular activities shall not use or possess tobacco, alcohol, or illicit drugs during the school year. These rules are in effect twenty-four (24) hours a day. If a student receives an IP or is seen using tobacco, alcohol, or illicit drugs, the student will forfeit the privilege of participating in all extracurricular activities, except graduation.

Policy Coverage

A student shall not: (1) use, possess, sell or distribute alcohol, tobacco, or illegal drugs or associate with someone who illegally does any of the above; or (2) abuse prescription or non-prescription drugs. This policy does not apply to prescribed drugs used under a doctor, supervision and as prescribed. "Possess" is to use a prohibited substance, have a prohibited substance in personal possession, or knowingly (as a reasonable and prudent person would know) being present at a function or gathering at which a prohibited substance is illegally used. This policy is in effect each school year from the date of first (1st) fall practice of fall activities (August) until the last day of all school activities. Specific penalties for violation of this policy are listed below and are rendered at the discretion of the administration. (i.e. the earliest scheduled practice among football, volleyball, cross-country)

Students subject to the actions below will receive due process, except when students self-report or report when confronted. (See definition below)

Policy Duration

This policy is in effect each school year from the date of first (1st) practice of fall activities (August) until the last day of activities. (Specific penalties for violation of this policy are listed in student and athletic handbooks (and in 3340P)

Due Process

If it is determined a student has violated this policy, the student shall be notified of the violation by telephone when possible and by mail. Also at this time the student shall be notified of the type of discipline to be administered

First Offense 3340P

- 1. Penalty of twelve (12) school days (if self-reported within 48 hours of infraction). (Self-reporting is considered an unsolicited, offender-initiated admission of guilt).
- Penalty of sixteen (16) school days (if offender offers admission of guilt when confronted by coach or administration-termed "confronted reporting". This admission of guilt must occur immediately upon confrontation).
- 3. Student may lose letter and/or awards.
- 4. Coach/advisor may allow student to practice if in an extracurricular activity.

OR

- 1. Penalty of twenty four (24) school days (without self-reporting or without "confronted reporting").
- Student may lose letter and/or awards if in an extracurricular activity.
- 3. Coach/advisor may allow student to practice if in an extracurricular activity.

Second Offense

- 1: Penalty of forty (40) school days (if self-reported within 48 hours of infraction).
- 2. Penalty of sixty (60) school days (with "confronted reporting").
- 3. Penalty of seventy-five (75) school days without reporting as listed above.
- 4. Student will lose letter and/or awards if in an extracurricular activity.
- 5. Student will not be allowed to practice if in an extracurricular activity.

Third Offense

- 1. Penalty of one calendar year (365 days).
- 2. Student will not be allowed to participate if in an extracurricular activity.

In addition, these rules and consequences will be based upon the following definitions:

1. All penalties are based upon school days and calendar years. No time is adjusted for school vacations, weekends, or time that occurs between seasons (e.g., a student that self-reports to an administrator on Christmas Day of a first-offense alcohol possession on Christmas Live will not begin his/her 12-day penalty until classes resume in January.)

2. The principal will be responsible for the implementation of these rules.

- 3. Offenses accumulate during a given school year. Only the penalty for the third offense earries over to the next school year.
- 4. Rules are in effect 24 hours/day throughout the entire school year from the date of first (1st) practice of fall activities (August) until the last day of activities

5. Penalties begin at the time that discipline is taken against the student.

6. If a student is under a disciplinary action while participating in co-corricular activity (i.e. band/choir) student may be required to follow a restricted participation plan.

APPEAL PROCESS: Any parent or student aggrieved by imposition of discipline shall have the right to an informal conference with the principal to resolve the greyance. At the conference the student and parent shall be subject to questioning by the principal and shall be entitled to question staff involved in the matter being grieved.

COLLEGE PREPARATORY PROGRAM

Montana University System -- Montana Board of Regents of Higher Education

In order to improve students' preparation for college-level work, the Montana Board of Regents of Higher Education requires the following Minimum Core College Preparatory Program for students who wish to enter into a 4-year campus of the Montana University System (does not apply to the Colleges of Technology). The Rigorous Core which was created as an alternative to the mathematics proficiency expectations of the Montana University System is also shown. That Rigorous Core is also the criteria for the MUS Honors Scholarship.

English

Minimum Core - 4 years: In each year the content of the courses should have an emphasis upon the development of written and oral communication skills and literature. Rigorous Core - 4 years: In addition to the Minimum Core, a designated college-prep or research-writing course is recommended

Social Studies

Minimum Core - 3 years: The courses shall include Global Studies (such as World History or World Geography); American History; and Government, Economics, Indian History or other third year courses.

Note: Students must complete a full year of global studies such as World History or World Geography, a full year of American History, and an additional year in another social studies field such as economics, problems of democracy, psychology, sociology, tribal government, Indian History. (Per Joyce A. Scott, Deputy Commissioner for Academic & Student Affairs, April 2002.) Rigorous Core - 3 years: As above, with the recommendation of an additional one half year or more of other courses such as psychology, humanities.

Mathematics

Minimum Core - 3 years: Courses shall include Algebra I, Geometry and Algebra II (or the sequential content equivalent of these courses.) Students are encouraged to take a math course in their senior year.

Note: See information regarding Algebra I taken in the 8th grade

**Rigorous Core - 3 or 4 years: In addition to the Minimum Core, a course beyond Algebra II, or Integrated Math IV (such as Trigonometry, Pre-Calculus, Calculus, Computer Math, or Integrated Math VI.) All must have grades of "C" or better.

Laboratory Science

Minimum Core - 2 years: One year must be earth science, biology, chemistry, or physics; the other year can be one of those sciences or another approved college preparatory laboratory

**Rigorous Core - 3 or 4 years: Full year of each: General or earth science; biology; chemistry or physics.

** *Three years of mathematics, including a course beyond Algebra II, and 4 years of laboratory science may be substituted for the four years of mathematics and three years of science requirement.

Electives

Minimum Core - 2 years chosen from the following:

World Language (preferably two years)

Computer Science

Visual and Performing Arts (including Speech/Debate)

Vocational Education units which meet the Office of Public Instruction guidelines

Rigorous Core - 3 years chosen from the following:

2 years of a World Language

Computer Science

Visual and Performing Arts (including Speech/Debate)

Vocational Education units which meet OPI guidelines (such as Information Technology,

Computer Science.)

Students can complete the Regent's College Preparatory Program (3 years of math, 2 of science, and 2 of electives) to enter any of Montana's four-year universities. However, students who take more rigorous coursework in high school, maintain high GPAs, and score well on the ACT or SAT are most likely to be successful in college. The Montana Board of Regents adopted the Rigorous Core as a requirement for the MUS Honors Scholarships in order to assure that the most meritorious students would compete for these scholarships and to assure that their Grade Point Averages would be based on a similar set of rigorous courses. The complete text of the applicable policies can be found within the Board of Regents Policy Manual: http://mus.edu/borpol/default.asp.

- Policy 301.1 Admission Requirements for Undergraduates into Four-year University Programs, section B, Demonstration of Mathematics Proficiency, offers the Rigorous Core as an alternative to meeting the minimum mathematics scores of 22 on ACT, 520 on SAT, or 3 on AP for FULL admission status.
- Policy 501.1 requires that to be eligible for the MUS Honors Scholarship effective 2010, applicants must have completed this Rigorous Core.
